Is there a decline in high schoolers because they are opting to go to private schools?

Important for the towns to combine more, recreation departments, programs A one track plan is not as bad, elementary schools have a lot in common except grade combinations and assemblies every week (pro because more public speaking at a younger age)

The board is split but trying to unify an education system

Regionalizing the towns, more than just the school systems

When do you cut it off at combining the two towns?

A big positive to the district is having more than one choice

Two programs that are old... is the common core contradicting that

If it is the same material and curriculum why are they separated? Unless they are being taught the same, because teachers all go to the same development

Different schools in the district have different approaches in punishment and reward but they teach the same bigger picture material

Evening out the school systems in different towns vs. regionalizing it Needs to allow the parents to make a choice on how they want their child to be taught

Has to make financial sense to all members of the town

Members of the town want to see the # of Durham residents sending children to Lyman vs # of Middlefield members sending their children to Brewster

Losing a school and all the people that have worked there \rightarrow what impact does that have on the town and economy

Are these the only options? → only one school in Middlefield, could we close Strong? Expand on memorial? Want the numbers for all the options

Figure out what options D is \rightarrow like having a choice for parents to make Option C is not an option

Option C is an option bc if the population increases it would be a shame to have all the schools in one town

Leaves room for the future to allow incline in the Lyman school system

How long does a student have to ride on the bus?

Cost of transportation is a big factor -> need to reduce bus count

Can you go to other schools but only have a bus for that towns students... the child can go to that school because they are in the district but the parents have to drive them

There should be an option for the child to loop (you stay with the same teacher for more than one year) if they want to

 - Middlefield has lots of room that can be developed.
 - o Demographics.
 - o Cost down the road when demographics change?
 - John Lyman could possibly be a very good investment. What will the cost be if we invest or don't?
 - Small group of BOE should not make such a small decision.
 - Korn/ JL closures were a combined deal.
 - Taxed like crazy in this town-however in certain neighborhoods families are leaving once a child graduates and taxes are left in the hands of the citizens.
 - Part of purpose of CC was so everyone was following the same protocol and learning.

 - Earlier integration- if 2 programs (like in related arts)
 - o Too much division
 - · Taking away choice would make any option unacceptable
 - o Flexibility is important
 - Board needs to stay financially responsible
 - Who shows up to the voting? Cater towards who is going to be voting
 - 2 programs 1 school option- would eliminate the double bussing, bring neighborhoods together, allow parents to have the choice of programs but not schools

 - Upset about potential cost of options (feel that not all costs are accurate)
 - Information presented to smaller committee meetings differs from public forums
 - What happens if there's another demographic increase?
 - Cost of maintaining Lyman versus cost of opening brand new school
 - Concern is if a school closes and demographics increase
 - Difficult planning for unknown future enrollment
 - Concerned about the challenge of an enrollment increase in the long term
 - Perception of board is going to move forward without reimbursement
 - Dividing K-5 by town is not a good idea; merging students from both towns early is a good (fewer transitions); more opportunities for different age groups interacting
 - Recommend that Lyman students go to Memorial and Brewster students remain; incoming students get a choice
 - Not many people are aware of school configuration discussion
 - Needs to be publicized better

 - Make sure needs/education of every child is met without extra spending
 - K-5 (structural beneficial)
 - Keep Lyman open
 - Maintaining choice

- o There is a divide between the people of the two schools

 - Don't like being town specific, want the students to be a community and be able to interact with each other, don't want to be separated
 - o Maybe put preschool with first grade?
 - o Want to maintain both programs
 - o There isn't enough credibility on the Board
 - o Why is the principal at Brewster only contracted for one year?
 - o Don't like how there are so many separate schools

 - Look at question 2
- 4. Knowing that you may have a strong preference for one of these options, we would like you to assume that you don't get your first choice. What would make the final proposal acceptable to you?
 - Preference is for integrated day
 - Want to maintain the hot school status
 - Keep a lot of the teachers from the integrated day community (ones that understand the learning style)
 - How do you decide which teachers stay and which ones go
 - o Have all teachers have training in integrated day
 - o Assembly (hot school)
 - Multi age
 - o Different learning styles
 - Community
 - Passion for the district
 - o People are invested in a "quality" district
 - Want to keep elementary schools (two different programs): it can attract more people to move into the town
 - People want the schools to be town centralized so they are close to the school (don't want to travel far)
 - Supporting the house prices for the people
 - The schools aren't big enough to hold all of the grades (lower school or upper school assemblies)

- All school assemblies with parents and schools
- o Fix the gyms that are unsafe for the students
- o Project approach (PBL)
 - Test scores Lyman vs Brewster (benchmark)
 - Utilize what worked from both school systems
 - Learn the same topics, just change the style to help the students
 - Teach students with a single person basis (don't miss helping any one student)
 - Want to see an increase in the test scores (% of growth)
 - There shouldn't be a gap between the different grades
- Want to improve the overall performance of the students (relate to other schools)
- Shouldn't be fully focused on test scores
- Having students and teachers all in one building would make it easier to relate the students
- Climate and culture:
 - All students learn and act differently
 - Extroverts and introverts (ID allows both students to succeed)
 - Measure the success
 - Being able to know older students (study buddies) make the students feel more like a community (multi age)
- o Assemblies and public speaking are a base for good growth
- Values that come from the community and the school shape the students into very mature young adults
- o Don't rush the decision
- o Option D is too vague to be an option make it more specific
 - Retention of the ID system
